TOWARDS **ACCELERATED** REDUCTION IN PREVENTABLE MATERNAL DEATHS



Improving maternal health continues to be a priority of the Government of South Sudan (GOSS) and one of key commitments made at the ICPD@25 Nairobi Summit. One of the key interventions supported during the year the launch of the revised was Comprehensive Reproductive Health Policy and the investment case for ending preventable maternal deaths. and endorsing the GOSS commitments to prioritize sexual and reproductive health and rights.

Initiatives included strengthening the training and deployment of human resources for maternal health including midwives and nurses, treatment and management of obstetric fistula, supporting capacity building of the South Sudan Nurses and Midwives Association and the Association of Obstetricians and Gynecologists to play key roles in advocacy and strengthening quality of care, supporting the strengthening of the Maternal and Perinatal Death Surveillance and Response (MPDSR) system in the country, ensuring reproductive health commodity security by providing essential maternal health commodities and essential medicines, and strengthening the supply chain to ensure delivery to the last mile.

UNFPA also plays a critical role in the enabling environment of reproductive health with support provided for strengthening SRH strategies and legal frameworks.

UNFPA is also implementing social and behaviour change communication and demand generation initiatives to increase uptake of maternal health services.

Twenty national tutors from HSIs across the country were admitted and commenced their training in health personnel education at the College of Physicians and Surgeons

Celebrating Obstetric Fistula Heroine in Juba

Soft-spoken, compassionate, and cheerful. Hayat Peter is one of the nurses who is contributing to ending obstetric fistula in Juba/South Sudan. A registered nurse by profession for the last 22 years, she has helped many patients. However, assisting fistula patients to regain their dignity is one of the biggest moments in her career, according to Hayat.

The 42-year-old is a mother of nine children, seven of which are adopted. Her husband died in 2007 while on duty as a police officer in Yambio State. Ever since she had to take care of her family as a single mother. life-long dream was to help women suffering from Obstetric fistula. Hayat works Teaching Hospital, the country's only referral hospital, and she is one of the 23 nurses trained to support fistula patients and offer obstetric care. "I am happy that I was trained to help women suffering from Fistula. I have supported over 200 fistula surgeries, I am proud of that," she confirms. through leads to dejection/abandonment by family and community members, but for Hayat, she provides hope and care to them; "I do not feel they are dirty, I talk to them, we laugh, hold hands, and hug. I burn an aromatic incense around the women which them feel comfortable and happy," she

During her 22-years nursing career, Hayat says most fistula patients are between 13-15 years something she attributes to early pregnancy and inadequate access to health facilities. "It is important to sensitize and educate young girls as well as communities not to expose them to sexual abuse, child marriage, and early pregnancies because their bodies are not developed enough to handle pregnancy," says Hayat

Her highest moments are when the survivors she serves call to express gratitude from the farthest parts of South Sudan, "Fistula survivors still call me to appreciate the free surgery that transformed their lives and this is not just once, it is rewarding and makes me proud," she adds with beaming smile.

To meet the ever-growing need for services for Fistula patients, UNFPA with partners mentors and trains health workers and sets up fistula repair teams from various states of South Sudan. These teams include fistula surgeons, medical officers, operating theatre nurses, midwives, ward nurses, and anesthetists in obstetric fistula surgery and care for fistula patients. Obstetric fistula is preventable but also surgically curable once it occurs.

The UNFPA programme in South Sudan is targeting to increase the modern contraceptive prevalence rate (for women aged 15-49 years) from 6% to 10% by 2025. In 2022, the South Sudan mCPR was projected to have increased to 4.7 from 4.4 in 2021. 99,000 women were projected to be using modern contraceptives.

Key Interventions

- Installed an electronic Warehouse Management System (mSupply) in Central Medical Store that is interlinked with other subsidiary warehouses improve the management of contraceptives at the Central Warehouse and improve visibility up to the regional warehouses.
 - Capacity building of 65 supply chain managers on management and monitoring of RH supplies and quantification of RH commodities to strengthen sub-national and SDP level monitoring of RH commodities to avoid stock-outs and overstocks at SDPs.
- Secured Government policy and governance commitment through the signing and launching of the RH Policy, FP Costed Implementation Plan, FP2030 commitments.
- Shift towards innovative community-based approaches for advocacy, demand generation and service provision through community-based agents including midwives that saw 121,682 women provided with FP services.
- 500 state level leaders were reached during FP dialogues to ensure they are supported to become agents of change.

How the use of modern contraceptives has empowered Ayen and her family

As you walk in the Suk Jow Market in Wau, you note a hype of activities with a lot of merchandise being traded. One can't help noticing the stand that has garments displayed with a couple of women behind busy working with the tailoring machines.

Ayen Abraham aged 34 a mother of five is busy on one of the machines and warmly shares her story on use of contraceptives as the other women listen.

"I have been married for 10 years now. When I just got married that is before I came to know about family planning, I used to conceive so frequently that I did not have time to do any work to earn something for the family. After the birth of my third child, my husband and I decided that I should go to Wau Teaching Hospital for family planning services. This is against our tradition, but we had no choice than doing it," she said.

Ayen shared the benefits she has experienced using family planning.

"I have a friend whom we got married in the same year and now she has 7 kids. For me, my last born is now almost four years old and enrolled in Pre-School. She added that the decision by the family to use modern contraceptives has paid off the family.

"My husband is a private police officer in South Sudan police service in Wau earning less than 2500 South Sudanese pound per month (which is less than 5 USD per month) and is not even enough to provide one meal in a day and send our kids to school.

However, since I started using modern contraceptive methods my life has changed." "I was able to enroll in a tailoring course which I finished in 2019 and now I am working in Suk Jow market as a tailor and every day I can manage to earn 10,000 to 15,000 thousand South Sudanese Pounds (equivalent to 23 USD) on a good market day. This has really improved our life in the family."

"My message to the other women out there is that the modern contraceptive methods are safe and can help empower women."

Realizing equality and inclusion for all

UNFPA continues to deepen the gender equality and addressing harmful practices such as child marriage through addressing the root causes of inequality by working with various stakeholders such as government, civil society, communities, traditional leaders such as paramount chiefs and religious leaders, young men and boys. As the lead for addressing GBV and harmful practices UNFPA promotes localization through capacity building support to the national women-led and gender equality and social inclusion focused organizations. UNFPA also supports the government through supporting policy and legal frameworks designing, monitoring and their implementation.

Child Marriage, a chronic cultural practice that traditional Chiefs vow to end

Different chiefs converged to discuss on the implementation of the strategic national action plan on ending child marriage and to commit their individual responsibility to see child marriage end starting with their communities.

The traditional Chiefs conference was part of the initiatives to end Child marriage by engaging the duty bearers and men to change the negative social norms and cultural practices that are harmful. The gathering offered an opportunity for learning and sharing among the chiefs and commitments to support the rights of women and girls through ending child marriage and supporting girls to fulfill their full potential.

"I appreciate the support and effort in putting this conference and gathering traditional Chiefs together with other stakeholders because only with the commitment by all stakeholders can we end child marriage in South Sudan. Our girls and daughters are suffering in various communities and we are all seeing this happen yet we should protect and support them. We ALL have a role to play in Ending Child marriage" Minister Hon. Aya Benjamin Warille urges the Chiefs.

The National champion to end child marriage, Hon. George Echom noted that the effects of child marriage and early childbearing are enormous which included dangers of fistula, vicious cycle of poverty, increased percentage of illiterate citizens as girls are married off without attending school. He challenged the Chiefs, Civil Society Organizations, and the Government to swiftly act. "We have denied access to education to our women and girls, without bringing women on board, we won't go forward, and for us to make huge strides, we need to take girls to school, we also need to break the negative norms and attributes of our cultures which have become enemies to our prosperity" Hon Ochom noted.

He also cautioned men and Chiefs for marrying young girls whom he said end up becoming burdensome, "Chiefs, when u marry a child as a wife, you will have stress throughout your life, trust me, you will have a baby, not a wife, marrying children as wives is stressful, this must stop, and to move this country forward, we need to move away from harmful traditional practices" he added

This year's Conference was a follow-up event with traditional leaders and the State Ministries of Gender, Child, and Social Welfare to review the implementation of SNAP on ending child marriage, and in line with, The Palm Africa Declaration of 2019, 2020, and 2021 action plans. Different states resolved individually to end child marriage and other harmful traditional practices in their respective states.

"Child marriage is a contributing factor to why girls don't finish theireducation. We should allow girls to be girls and not make them brides. We remain committed to ending child marriage and ensuring girls attain their full potential" said Amb. Ms. Linken Berryman, of Norway.

Strategic partnerships

UNFPA Country Office held high level partnerships and advocacy meetings. Among these included meetings with three Vice Presidents of the Republic of South Sudan. This strengthened collaboration to implement programs that contribute to efforts to improve the well-being of women, girls, and young people for entire people to thrive in the country. Together with a wide range of partners, UNFPA works toward the goal of universal access to sexual and reproductive health and rights.

Dignity in Humanitarian / Crisis

UNFPA continues to provide life-saving SRH and GBV interventions in South Sudan. These include provision of reproductive health medical supplies and delivery of clinical RH and sexual violence services. UNFPA undertakes training of healthcare professionals on the MISP for reproductive health and clinical management of rape.

UNFPA plays a pivotal role in the coordination of RH and GBV services to ensure robust partnerships and collaboration achieve timely, quality and comprehensive delivery of information and services. UNFPA delivers social protection interventions such as cash voucher assistance and Women and Girls Friendly Spaces to cushion survivors and those at risk from victimization.

Population Data and Evidence

Ensuring availability of up-to-date reliable population date remains a foundation for UNFPA programming. Information and data on population are critical for good governance, policy formulation, development planning, and making decisions on social welfare programmes. UNFPA provided technical and financial support to strengthen the systems that resulted into production of various pieces of evidence and policies including:

Key achievements 2022

The South

The South Sudan 2022 Gender Based Violence (GBV) Prevalence survey was conducted to meet the critical gap of evidence in South Sudan

The Population Estimates Survey (PES) conducted by the National Bureau of Statistics supported by UNFPA that produced the Modelled Population Estimates

Development. Approval and launch of key policy documents including the Reproductive Health Policy, the Costed Investment Cases for the Transformative Results (End Preventable Maternal Deaths, End Unmet Need for family Planning, End GBV and Child Marriage), and the Costed Implementation Plan for Family Planning

In addition to production of different pieces of evidence and policies, capacity of 100 staff from National Bureau of Statistics (NBS), Government Ministries Departments and Agencies (MDA), UN agencies, Universities was enhanced through training in contemporary methods of data collection, analyses and reporting.

UNFPA continued to promote national efforts to advocate for prioritizing ICPD and population issues at all levels through:

- Strengthening the advocacy capacity of the South Sudan Parliamentary Network on Population and Development. About 300 members of the Revitalized Transitional National Legislative Assembly were oriented on Population and Development and the GBV/SRH bills that need parliamentary consideration. Through parliamentary outreach to states, a total of 500 state level leaders and about 20,000 people were reached with messages on family planning and GBV/child marriage.
- Support to the National Ministry of Finance and Planning to establish a population unit that will coordinate the national population program, spearhead the integration of ICPD/population issues in national and sector plans and monitor the implementation of the Voluntary ICPD@25 National Commitments.




Young People

UNFPA country office supports the provision of adolescent and youth-friendly services and strengthening youth leadership and participation. UNFPA engaged young people through sports: Football, Boxing, and Rugby as shift norms towards ending child marriage, promote gender equality and positive masculinity. The interventions targeted young people in development and humanitarian settings.

The country office is also supporting the provision of integrated SRH/HIV and CSE services to adolescent and young people in secondary schools. 41, 211 young people were reached with information and 16, 708 with services.

The power of female sports in norms shifting: UNFPA collaboration with the Bright Starlets, the National Women's Football team

Women's participation in sports has a long history. It is a history marked by division and discrimination but also one filled with major accomplishments by female athletes and important advances for gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls.

Increased involvement of women and girls can promote positive development in sports by providing alternative norms, values, attitudes, knowledge, capabilities, and experiences. The contributions of women, particularly in leadership positions, can bring diversity and alternative approaches and expand the talent base in areas such as management, coaching, and sports journalism.

Women in sports leadership can shape attitudes toward women's capabilities as leaders and decision-makers, especially in traditionally male domains. Women's involvement in sports can make a significant contribution to public life and community development.

"The participation of women and girls in sports challenges gender stereotypes and discrimination and can therefore be a vehicle to promote gender equality. Football cuts across tribes and boarders which accelerate peace and unity, and the empowerment of women and girls for the benefit of communities" said Grace Soga, a female athlete.

Particularly in traditionally masculine fields, women in sport leadership can influence opinions around leadership, decision-making ability, can significantly improve society and their communities. UNFPA South Sudan is partnering with Starlets for Change Organization to harness the power of Sports to improve menstrual hygiene management, promote gender equality, prevent Gender Based Violence (GBV), and end child marriage.

"Exploring the intersection of football and reproductive health in South Sudan reveals not just the current knowledge, attitudes, and practices of adolescents and young people, but also the potential to empower and educate through sports." – Stella Bosire, SRH consultant

UNFPA conducted a focus group discussion with sportswomen, adolescent boys, and girls from various schools in Juba to understand their sexual and reproductive health needs. The engagement offered a platform for young girls to share their experiences on menstrual health management, access to reproductive health services, and understanding of gender-based violence, including the dangers of forced and child marriage.

The discussions will inform the development of a handbook/training manual which will be used in a yearlong cascade training by youth-led networks and adolescent reproductive health.

To improve menstrual health management during sports time at the stadium, UNFPA is further supporting the installation of a self-care facility for female footballers and support the team with training equipment for their talents to grow and become change makers in their communities.
